Infrastructure. I subsequently had a follow up discussion with Council Management where we have agreed to wait for an updated study on harbour movements from the Clontarf/Bantry Bay Estuary Management Study conducted in 2007. Council has indicated that the repeated erosion requires a well thought out strategic plan which we await with great interest. In the interim Council has agreed to build a strong timber sea wall similar to the one at the end of Monash Crescent. Council does not want to commit to the sandstone sea wall, as we suggested, at present, as they are concerned that a repeat occurrence of substantial sand erosion off the point could undermine a sandstone wall and cause an even larger problem with heavy sandstone falling into the harbour causing further destabilization of the beach and therefore threaten the Norfolk Pines on the edge of the reserve.

We were also able to obtain a response on the replacement of a pedestrian island in Ethel Street which was removed as part of the Balgowlah RSL upgrades. The issue was discussed at the Northern Beaches Traffic Committee in August and a recommendation to support the reinstatement will be sent to Council in late August and we fully expect approval will be given for the refuge to be reinstated. This is a real win for the Clontarf Community Forum.

We did not hear back on the connection to water for the dog tap in Sandy Bay Reserve, nor did we hear back on the long standing recommendation to upgrade the Graham Street Steps to make them safer by equalising the risers and redirecting water run off to a channel on the side of the steps. We have raised these questions again in the August minutes and hope for a response for our September meeting.

Lynne Young and Steve Schenaigal represented the Clontarf Community Forum at the Odour Control meetings organised by Sydney Water to consider the best approach to manage the damaging internal buildup of gas in the sewerage lines. It has been decided that the required new unit will be installed on the Mosman side of Middle Harbour hidden by the Egyptian Concrete Structure and the gases will be treated and redirected back into the sewerage line rather than expelled into the air. This is a satisfactory result after a very comprehensive process.

The Clontarf Community Forum will meet at 7.45 on Wednesday 7th September at the INTERIM LOCATION of Balgowlah Bowling Club, Bareena Drive, Balgowlah Heights.



CLONTARF HISTORY NOTES – THE ORIGINS OF STREET AND PLACE NAMES

Alder Street. Named after Mr. H.R. Alder, Deputy Town Clerk, 1927 Allenby Street. Named after Field Marshall Viscount Allenby,

- Cavalry Commander WWI, who led the invasion of Palestine and captured Jerusalem from the Turks on Dec 9, 1917. He was also a natron of Lawrence of Arabia
- Alma Street. Named after the river Alma, 12 miles north of Sebastapol after the Battle of Alma in the Crimean War 1854. **Amiens Road.** Named after the site of the appalling trench
- battles in the Somme Battle of Amiens, WWI.
- Barrabooka Street. From aboriginal term for "hunting ground". Beatrice Street. Named after the daughter of Mayor Griffin.
- Castle Rock Crescent. Formerly part of Ogilvy Road, re-named by Council resolution 4 Nov 1975. Near Castle Rock.
- Cutler Road. Named after Sir Roden Cutler, VC, war hero and later State Governor. Previously known as Moore Street. Ethel Street. 1880 named after the daughter of Mayor Griffin.
- Fairbairn Avenue. Named after Alderman W. Fairbairn, Mayor of Manly, 1959.
- Fisher Bay. Named after John Fisher's 30 acre holding of 1840. Gordon Street. Named after Major General Charles Gordon. Hero
- of the Sudan war. Australia's first overseas battle. Harbourview Street. Geographical.
- Heaton Avenue. Francis W. Heaton, Mayor in 1918 and 1922, early Manly family.
- Holmes Avenue. Named after Major General William Holmes (1862-1917), Commander of 5th Brigade AIF at Gallipoli.
- Originally known as Wharf Street when the ferries were in use. Kanangra Crescent. Aboriginal for "beautiful view"
- Linkmead Avenue. Named after the 1913 development known as Linkmead Point Estate.
- Maretimo Street. Named after the house belonging to Mayor J.G. Griffin.



Peronne Avenue. Named after the battlefield outside Paris where Australian troops fought in WW1

Ogilvy Road. Named after Adam Ogilvy, who was mayor (1917)

and secretary of the swimming club. Was originally known as

Monash Crescent. Named after Sir John Monash, Field Marshal

Moore Street. Named after Elizabeth Moore. land-owner (60

acres) at Clontarf and licensee of the Clontarf Hotel 1834.

Plant Street. Named after Mr. John Plant Wright 1910, Garden Estate owner, boot maker (with 500 workers) and Bowling Club president for 8 years

Russell Street. Named in 1899 after Alderman Adam Russell who was known for planting pines and establishing the Ladies' Baths. Sandy Bay Road. Geographical.
